LIBR 2195: Medical and Legal Libraries [Modified for Summer 2018 term]

Course Description, Prerequisites, and Co-requisites:

This 13-week course in the Langara College Library & Information Technology Program provides a survey of key sources, tools and information systems used within two specialized subject areas and library environments (or sectors).

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify major sources of information in legal and medical libraries
- Answer a wide variety of commonly-asked legal and medical reference questions
- 3. Understand the ethical issues around providing reference service in legal and medical sectors
- 4. Understand and describe important issues in these special library environments or sectors, particularly related to sources of information, and the provision of library services
- 5. Identify and describe key library and information organizations that support the activities in these special library environments or sectors
